Thanks to the incredible generosity of people like you, we have successfully raised \$4 million for our future leaders and changemakers of the North. We are now \$1.5 million away from achieving our campaign goal.

To raise the remaining amount, we hope the community will come together to invest in our transformative new science building and help make this vital facility a reality.

Our new facility will allow students to learn in a state-of-the-art environment. This will immediately reduce instructional space constraints and allow us to expand existing priority programs and degree offerings. The new science building will support in-territory training for healthcare workers with cutting-edge laboratories, ensuring Yukoners receive exceptional health care delivered by professionals deeply connected to our communities.

This is an opportunity for us to deliver more than a learning building but a learning experience that encompasses our values as a University for the North.

Site preparation and construction of Yukon University's new science building begins, following a ground-blessing ceremony with Yukon First Nations leaders.

Construction continues, including lab spaces, classrooms, and culturally inclusive design features, all built to zero-carbon and accessibility standards.

The building opens, offering state-of-the-art indoor and outdoor teaching and learning spaces that reflect northern and Indigenous knowledge systems.



Our researchers have conducted, mobilized, and shared research on northern topics for over three decades.

Our Northern Energy Innovation team is applying unique expertise in northern electric power systems to support communities and the energy industry across the territories with the energy transition. We specialize in integrating renewables in remote communities, electrification of heat and transportation, and grid modernization through smart grids, microgrids, distributed energy resources, and demand side management as it pertains to our unique northern context.

The Yukon Strategy for People and Patient-Oriented Research (YSPOR) works to transform healthcare research for better health outcomes in the Yukon. Housed at YukonU and part of a national network, YSPOR is a collaboration between the Government of Canada, and the Yukon, offering specialized services to researchers, patients, clinicians, policymakers, and SPOR-funded entities, enabling patient-oriented research and evidence-based healthcare solutions.

YOUR IMPACT

Investments in recent years have led to tangible, real-world outcomes.

A \$2.5 million, five-year generous investment from the Walter Duncan Gordon Foundation towards empowering Canada's North, arctic science, and Indigenous self-determination through Yukon University.

A \$1 million gift from Northern Vision Development (NVD) to establish and maintain a Research Chair for the Indigenous Governance Degree program. The Research Chair conducts research related to concepts associated with northern governance. particularly as they relate to collaboration between the four levels of government in the Yukon.

An anonymous Yukoner pledged \$250,000 over five years towards establishing a Northern Social Work Chair position; a program very close to their heart and how they would like to invest in the future of the North.

A \$225,000 gift (pledged over 10 years) from Borealis Fuels. This gift builds capacity for Yukon University to develop new programming, giving flexibility and stability to support growth and development in the early years of these programs.

A \$40,000, five-year investment from Eagle Hill Energy Ltd. A partnership to establish the Thäy Täw Energy Trust to support YukonU's land-based programming and decrease barriers to access. This gift will provide students with hands-on, culturally relevant learning experiences that connect them to the land, Indigenous knowledge, and sustainable practices.

A \$250,000, ten-year investment from Ketza Construction enables an additional 12-student carpentry cohort, addressing an urgent demand for up-to-date skilled workers in this field. In honor of this gift, Ketza Construction Carpentry Shop is the new name for our carpentry training space at Ayamdigut - Yukon University in Whitehorse.

A \$250,000, five-year investment from Whitehorse Motors is helping support student accessibility, mental health, and wellness in trades at Yukon University. This transformational give is helping students enhance their academic success, safety, and overall well-being. By providing mental health resources, students can develop resilience, manage stress effectively, and improve focus.




